An historic day”, “A Pentecost experience”; “A beautiful, joyful Church” — these were among the impressions of those taking part in the “Charisms in communion” gathering that took place on October 23rd in Assisi. Among the more than 2,000 participants were members of the Franciscan Family and representatives of around 40 ancient charisms who were meeting a large number of representatives of ecclesial movements and new communities. Many underlined the continuity with the Whitsun Vigil in Rome in 1998, when John Paul II called the ecclesial movements “essential” to the Church. On that occasion, Chiara Lubich had stated: “Christ’s Spouse is adorned with jewels without number, hotbeds of saints and heroes (...) fruits of the charisms bestowed by the Holy Spirit through the centuries,” and she foresaw flowing from the communion among them all “a Church that would be more unified, more attractive, warmer, more familiar and more dynamic, more Marian and more charismatic.” The bishop of Assisi pointed to St. Francis’ attitudes, which he said are required of us all today: first, a willingness to let go of our own limited views and ways of doing things so that God could freely give to each the charism that would make him or her genuine in their own way; and secondly, to be ready to welcome our neighbor’s charism in the same way that the Little Poor Man embraced the leper. In that embrace, he discovered the source of the most profound joy.

All of the musical performers were amazingly talented. The only disappointing aspect of the concert was the low attendance and lack of support by our members at this fraternity event.

At our fraternity gathering on Sunday, October 17, we completed phase three, the Design Phase, of the Appreciative Inquiry Process. We shared ideas on how to achieve Dream 2 (Get the message out: "who are Secular Franciscans and what do we do") and Dream 3 (Develop inter-Franciscan outreach programs). I want to assure you that I have heard all of your ideas and will work with the leadership team and all of you to move these ideas and dreams forward. It is our hope that you will participate in the final phase of the process, the Destiny Phase, which focuses on what will be and is designed to elicit personal commitments in moving these ideas forward, at the January fraternity gathering.

PLEASE NOTE ON YOUR CALENDAR AND PLAN TO ATTEND THE EUCHARISTIC CELEBRATION WHICH WILL INCLUDE THE RITE OF PROFESSION ON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 21 AT 1:30 P.M. This year, three candidates (**Patricia Cardello**, **Ilene Manning** and **Mary Williams**) completed the formation process and will make their permanent commitment to live the Gospel way of life in the Secular Franciscan Order. I invite all fraternity members to participate in this joyous celebration in the life of our fraternity and to show our love and support to Pat, Ilene and Mary as they join us in living the Gospel way of life.

During the next few weeks, I encourage you to spend some quiet time reflecting on: 1) your own Profession Day and the feelings you experienced when you publicly expressed your determination to live the Gospel way of life; 2) what does that commitment mean to you today? and; 3) In what ways has your life been enriched because of your Secular Franciscan vocation?

Remember what Christ taught and let his words enrich your lives and make you wise; teach them to each other and sing them out in psalms and hymns, singing to the Lord with thankful hearts. And whatever you do or say, let it be as a representative of the Lord Jesus, and come with him into the presence of God the Father to give him your thanks (Colossians 3:12-17).

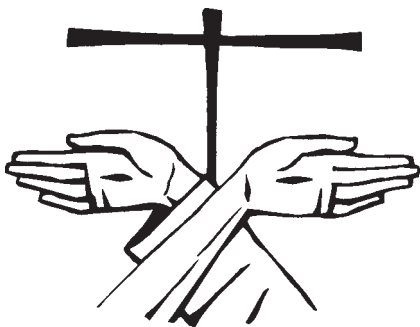

Celebrating Joseph Boland



Joseph Boland was born on August 24, 1926 at East Side General Hospital in Detroit, Michigan. Joe is the only child of Thomas Patrick Boland and Minnie May Osborne. He attended St. Phillip Neri Grade School and High School. He studied electrical engineering at

the University of Detroit. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Fire Prevention and Occupational Safety from Madonna College in 1978. Joe served in the Navy from July 1944 to June 1946. After his term in the Navy was finished, Joe was employed as a mechanic at Cummins Diesel Service and Sales of Michigan for a period of 2 ½ years.

In July, 1952, Joe was employed by the City of Detroit, Fire Department for over 33 years. Joe spent only 2 ½ years fighting fires and then transferred to the Fire Marshal Division where he was assigned to the Public Instruction Section. Joe retired from the Fire Department in 1985.

In 1952, Joe married Betty Deneweth and they were blessed with nine children (one child lived only 11 hours). All the children attended Catholic School except for the youngest who went to public high school because, when Joe married Faye, they moved to Warren and there were no Catholic high schools close to their home or on a direct bus route for him to get back and forth from home to school.

After Betty died at the age of 52, and Joe was finished with the mourning process, Joe talked to God saying that if he wanted him to remarry, God should find him a woman to marry. Further, Joe asked that it be someone who would help him save his soul and that I would look for her in church. Where do you think he found Faye; in church, at St. Aloysius on Washington Blvd. in Detroit. They both attended Mass at St. Al's during their lunch breaks and met there. Faye and Joe were married on March 17, 1984. They combined two large families into one huge family. Faye and her first husband, Ken, had six children. Betty and Joe had eight children.

Some of the joys Faye and Joe shared together during their life together were: Big family dinners, swimming, trailer camping, square dancing, and just being together.

Joe first learned about the Third Order at St. Phillip

Neri when one of the sisters told the students about the Third Order. After Joe was married, his father and a neighbor of his went to St. Bonaventure and became Novices (now called Inquirers). Joe's father was professed at St. Bonaventure on February 22, 1953. The next time Joe was introduced to the Third Order was, before Joe and Faye were married, Faye invited Joe to a cell meeting. Joe was apprehensive about attending the meeting because he knew Faye's first husband, Ken Kluk, had been a long time member. Joe was accepted with love by the cell members. Joe became a novice soon thereafter and was professed at St. Bonaventure in 1986.

Joe became involved in cell meetings and then gradually reached out to other activities, i.e., Eucharistic Minister at Mass, to the home bound, at nursing homes and now at a hospital. He has worked a few times at both of the St. Bonaventure Soup Kitchens. Joe took Maxine to the pain clinic every month for several years.

After Faye and Joe moved to Sterling Heights from Warren, they joined St. Rene Parish and became active in several parish ministries: taking Communion to the home bound, Meals on Wheels, adoration chapel, small group faith sharing in their home, ministering at a nursing home in the parish. They lived in the parish boundaries of St. Jane Frances de Chantal and transferred to that parish about three years ago.

Joe's hobbies include tinkering, garage sale sailing, swimming, photography and growing orchids. Being a part of the Secular Franciscan Order has given Joe a feeling of being a part of a group of holy, God loving people. It gives him a feeling of community, especially at the cell level. I feel in community with God.

DARCY

6 years old

atypical teratoid/rhabdoid (ATRT) brain tumor

Darcy and her siblings were outdoorsy kids who loved riding horses. At just 4 years old, Darcy was an accomplished rider and roper and had already earned a championship belt buckle for her skills. But life took a turn in late 2008 when Darcy fell and hit her head at school. She started suffering from terrible headaches and began vomiting within moments of opening her eyes each morning. Soon after, Darcy's parents were devastated when tests revealed she suffered from a deadly brain tumor known as ATRT. Darcy underwent a 10-hour surgery to remove the deadly tumor.

Darcy received four courses of chemotherapy and 31 radiation treatments. Despite her often grueling treatment, Darcy thrived at St. Jude. She loved participating in all the activities at the hospital, especially arts and crafts. To see her flourish meant the world to her parents.

Her family is appreciative of everything St. Jude provides for families, from housing to grocery cards. That they will never receive a bill from St. Jude means they can focus on what's important: Darcy. This has inspired them to help support St. Jude. "I'll keep giving," her mother said. "It makes a difference, even \$20."

Now that she is home, Darcy is back in school and she loves playing with her siblings. Darcy is also back to riding horses. She started slow on an old, gentle horse, but now she rides a fast one again.

Rule Reflection for November

SFO Constitutions, Article 25

Out of the conviction of the need to educate children to take an interest in community, "bringing them the awareness of being living, active members of the People of God" [see Apostolicam actuositatem, 30] and because of the fascination which Francis can exercise on them, the formation of groups of children should be encouraged. With the help of a pedagogy and an organization suitable to their age, these children should be initiated into a knowledge and love of the Franciscan life. National statutes will give appropriate orientation for the organization of these groups and their relationship to the fraternity and to Franciscan youth groups.
