

MINISTER'S LETTER

My dear brothers and sisters,

May God's peace be with you!

Volunteers are needed to assist with our fraternity picnic scheduled for **Sunday, July 17** at **1:30** p.m at **BELLE ISLE**. Sign-up sheets for food, beverages and other items will be available at the May and June fraternity gatherings. I want to remind each one of you of your responsibility as a professed member to attend fraternity gatherings and to contribute financially to our fraternity.

1) Your attendance at monthly fraternity gatherings is essential for the life of our fraternity as a whole and to your own spiritual growth in Franciscan spirituality. Article 24 of our SFO Rule states: "To foster communion among members, the council should organize regular and frequent meetings of the community as well as meeting with other Franciscan groups, especially with youth groups. It should adopt appropriate means for growth in Franciscan and ecclesial life and encourage everyone to a life of fraternity. This communion continues with deceased brothers and sisters through prayer for them."

2) Your monthly financial support is essential to provide us with the funds necessary to purchase supplies and to pay our monthly bills. Article 25 of the SFO Rule states: "Regarding expenses necessary for the life of the fraternity and the needs of worship, of the apostolate, and of charity, all the brothers and sisters should offer a contribution according to their means. Local fraternities should contribute toward the expenses of the higher fraternity councils." My brothers and sisters, your attendance and active participation at fraternity gatherings, as well as your monthly financial contribution are vital to the life of our fraternity.

REFLECTION

"Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit.'" (Jn 20:21-22)

"Jesus said to his disciples, 'All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the world.'" (Mt 28:18-20)

These Scripture passages are some of the final words of Jesus to his disciples. Jesus was sent by the Father to accomplish a specific mission on this earth — to manifest God's love, mercy, compassion to all people, to suffer, die and rise to new life. Now Jesus' mission is coming to an end, but before he leaves he gives his disciples with two gifts: peace and the Holy Spirit.

Just as Jesus commissioned the disciples to go and proclaim God's message of love, peace, mercy, hope and abundant life to all nations, we, too, as modern day disciples of Jesus, are called to do the same.

As followers of Christ, we are called to use our God-given talents and gifts in service to others and to bring about the Kingdom of God in our families, neighborhoods, parishes and places of employment.

My brothers and sisters, as Secular Franciscans, as disciples of Christ, as followers of St. Francis of Assisi, our mission is to go and proclaim the Gospel message not by our words but by the way in which we live our daily ordinary lives. The work of this mission may seem like an impossible task to accomplish because of our human weaknesses and limitations. Yet, God has given us the gift of his peace and the promise that he will be with us always. Every time we participate in the Eucharistic celebration, we are in the presence of the active and living God. Every time we receive the Body and Blood of Christ, the living bread of Christ, we receive nourishment and strength for our journey.

In order to build the Kingdom of God and proclaim God's message of love, we, as Secular Franciscans, have chosen to live our lives in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi, by making Christ the center of our lives and seeing Christ in every person we encounter and in all creation. We have also learned the importance of devoting time in our busy, fast-paced daily lives to meditate on the Gospel message and to allow the transformative power of the Word of God to change us into new creations.

My brothers and sisters, as Secular Franciscans, we have another tremendous source of strength, support and encouragement as we work to proclaim the Gospel message - we have the precious gift of each other. We are companions on the journey of building up and making visible the Kingdom of God's peace, mercy, hope and love in our world.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at our Fraternity Gathering on June 12 at 1:30 p.m. Remember to pray daily for vocations to the Secular Franciscan Order. May you experience anew the active and living presence of Christ with you.



TOWARD A SECULAR SPIRITUALITY

Lay people in the Church, including Secular Franciscans, are called to cultivate an authentic **lay spirituality** by which they are reborn as new men and women, both sanctified and sanctifiers, immersed in the mystery of God and inserted in society.

Such a spirituality will build up the world according to Jesus' Spirit. It will make people capable of looking beyond history without separating themselves from it, of cultivating a passionate love for God without looking away from their brothers and sisters whom they are able to see as the Lord sees them and love as the Lord loves them.

The lay faithful contribute "to the sanctification of the world, as from within like leaven, by fulfilling their own particular duties. Thus, especially by the witness of their own life ... they must manifest Christ to others" [*Lumen Gentium*, 31].

We cannot live two parallel existences: on the one hand, the so-called "spiritual" life, with its values and demands; and on the other, the so-called "secular" life, that is, life in a family, at work, in social relationships, in the responsibilities of public life and in culture" [see *Christifidelis Laici*, 59].

Integrating faith and "real" life means paying attention to these four fundamental elements of Christian living:

- using the Word of God as a reference point;
- having a vibrant Sacramental life;
- personal prayer enhanced by a discerning spiritual guide;
- living the social virtues and being committed to on-going formation in every sphere of one's life: personal, professional, cultural, etc.

The Opposite of a Religious Person is a Loveless Person

The title of this article comes from the renown philosopher-theologian, Prof. John D. Caputo. The line, startling to many at first glance, comes from his book *On Religion* (2001). Drawing on the thought of Augustine, Caputo opens his text with an examination of what it means to be a “religious person” and what it means to be an “irreligious person.” One of his many notions is that the opposite of a “religious person” is *not* a “secular” person. Caputo explains:

“**Religion is for lovers**, for men and women of passion, for real people with a passion for something other than taking profits, people who believe in something, who hope like mad in something, who love something with a love that surpasses understanding. Faith, hope and love, and of these three the best is love, according to a famous apostle (1 Cor 13:13). But what do they love? What do I love when I love my God? That is their question. That is my question.

The question, “what do I love when I love my God?” comes from Augustine’s *Confessions* and serves as central theme in Caputo’s reflection.

Caputo explains what he means by love: “One of the ideas behind ‘love’ is that it represents a giving without holding back, an ‘unconditional’ commitment, which marks love with a certain **excess**.” He goes on, Love is not a bargain, but unconditional giving; it is not an investment, but a commitment come what may. Lovers are people who exceed their duty, who look around for ways to do more than what is required of them. If you love your job, you don’t just do the minimum that is required; you do more. If you love your children, what would you not do for them?

“Love” and “God” belong together! The New Testament says that “God is Love.” To which, Caputo responds that “Love is God.” Love is the first name of God. ”To love God is to love something deeply and unconditionally. But it is also true that to love deeply and unconditionally is to be born of God, to love God, for the name of God is the name of love, the name of what we love.”

Instead of being caught up with various immaterial characteristics of what this or that person or group is concerned about in terms of judging who “is” or “is not” religious, perhaps we need to be more focused on the question that comes from St. Augustine – “who do I love when I love my God?” If, indeed, God is Love, then perhaps those who associate themselves most closely with love, associate themselves most closely with God.

I, like so many, have grown increasingly tired of small-minded “Christians” who misunderstand, misrepresent and mistake Scripture and use the Word of God as a weapon to exclude and marginalize. That a religious person is a loving person is a very Franciscan perspective. St. Bonaventure refers to the Triune God as “overflowing love,” from which creation emerges. Blessed John Duns Scotus hinges his whole metaphysical outlook and theological reflection on the primacy of Love. And St. Francis and St. Clare sought nothing more than to love God by loving others.

Caputo reminds us that, while most things are indeed best consumed or spent in moderation, love must be excessive and prodigal.

Only the spendthrift lovers of this world are the really religious. How about you?
